## Discussion Questions

- 1. There are two heroes in this story, Alex and Shin Wa. But they do very different things. In your opinion how are Alex and Shin Wa similar? How are they different?
- 2. Alex cannot talk about the death of her parents. It is too big for her. In fact, it actually becomes a character, IT. When Alex finally talks about IT, that character becomes weaker. Why? How can talking about important issues in your life change them?
- 3. If enough people recognize an object as standing for something, a symbol is born. In this story, a pearl represents wisdom. What are some other symbols in our culture? How are symbols born?
- 4. Is a is a supporting character, but she doesn't say anything until almost the end of the book. Can a silent character be as strong as one who talks? Explain.
- 5. The dragon story takes place thousands of years ago and seems very far away from our lives today—for instance, we don't have to find dragons to help people stop fighting. But people still fight each other today.

# Carve it Yourself

Tired of signing your name? Want to add a little art to your signature? This activity is just the thing. It shows you how to make your very own, one of a kind, Chinese seal.

### **Materials:**

1) A one to two-inch block of soft clay.

NOTE: Air-drying clay can be used, but baking clay is a little firmer and easier to handle.

- 2) A sharpened pencil.
- 3) Tracing paper.
- 4) A name or image.
- 5) Ink pad.

## **Instructions:**

- 1) Trace the name or image on tracing paper.
- 2) Go over it a few times until it is dark with the lead from the pencil.

- 3) Place the traced image face down on one side of the clay. This is called the chop.
- 4) Press down firmly so that the image on the tracing paper imprints on the clay and then remove. If you are using your name, like BELLA, it will leave an image that looks like this:

  AJJE

IMPORTANT: The image must be in reverse on the seal so that it prints facing the right way on paper.

- 5) Using the sharpened end of the pencil, carve the backwards image into the clay.
- 6) Now comes the hard part, waiting. The clay must be completely dry before the seal can be used. If it is not, the clay will absorb the ink and that makes it hard to use the seal with any other color.

TIP: If you are using air-drying clay, it can take up to a week to dry. If you are using baking clay, it usually takes about 20 minutes to bake. Then the clay has to cool, which takes around an hour.

- 7) Once the seal has dried and cooled, it's time to test it out.
- 8) Press the chop side of the seal into the ink pad.
- 9) Remove and blow a quick breath of hot air onto the inked chop. Sometimes ink clumps up on the seal. Hot air warms the ink and helps to spread it evenly across the seal.
- 10) Press the inked chop onto a piece of absorbent paper, like regular printer paper.


NOTE: Paper that is shiny or has a waxy finish like magazine paper will not absorb the ink.

11) Remove the seal and *Presto!* Your very own, one-of-a-kind, seal.

This seal is called an intaglio seal. The stamping image is carved into the seal.

Intaglio seals produce white images on ink-colored backgrounds.

If you want to take your carving skills a step further, try making a relief seal. Instead of carving the image into the clay, carefully carve the background away so that the image rises above the surface of the seal. The result is an ink-colored image on a white background. It takes patience and a steady hand. Try it out and see what you can do.
